#### WHERE WE ARE NOW

Tiny Seed is celebrating our fifth year of empowering project leaders to create positive change in their communities! We had a very successful 2023, with total program services funding increasing by 50% to \$977,365 and continued expansion of our portfolio of community projects.


During 2023, Tiny Seed sponsored 22 Fiscally Sponsored Projects (FSPs) that align with our mission, an increase from 17 last year. Our onboarding process was streamlined, allowing us to add eight impactful new FSPs, while three former projects achieved their goals and were wound down.

**Improved FSP selection criteria with our "Three C's" document.** As part of our onboarding and fundraising strategies, we identified priority project types within the three Cs of our mission: Conservation, Creativity, and Community. See page 7 for details. We also tightened our geographic focus area to VT, NH, ME, and MA.

Tiny Seed received a grant for Nonprofit Capacity Building from the Vermont Community Foundation in 2023. This led to several important improvements including a refined mission statement, clearer website, new logo, and generation of a compelling Funding Proposal to share with future funding partners.

Investment in subscription to Instrumentl, an online grant-seeking and management platform. Our use of Instrumentl in 2023 saved us 2,178 hours in grant research and brought in an additional \$193,000 for our sponsored projects. Tiny Seed's return on investment was 395% based on the annual subscription fee of \$3,900 generating an additional \$15,400 in direct revenue for Tiny Seed. We will continue our Instrumentl subscription in 2024.

**Funding Proposal for Mission Delivery Team.** Tiny Seed continues to be run by three contract workers who provide daily support for FSPs in operations, finance, and development. During 2023, our contractors were paid from service fee revenue generated on incoming funds to each fiscally sponsored project. During 2024 one of Tiny Seed's primary strategic goals is to attain funding that allows a transition to permanent employees for our Directors of Operations, Finance, and Development.



### 2023 REVENUE

Program Services: \$977,365 (+50%)

Sponsor Services: \$89,838 (+121%)


In 2023, Tiny Seed saw continued strong organic growth in Program Services revenue as we expanded our portfolio from 17 to 22 programs, and many existing programs increased fundraising activities. Total Program Services revenue increased 50% to \$977,365 and represents solid funding support from many sources including private donations, foundations, government grants, corporate grants, and fundraising events.

To support Tiny Seed's administrative platform, Sponsor Services revenue increased 121% to \$89,838 as a result of FSP fees on incoming funds, as well as direct grants to support sponsor services overhead costs. We are an industry leader in terms of efficiency, with 91.6% of revenues available for program-related activities, with the remaining 8.4% of revenue allocated to administration and operating expenses.

#### 2023 ADMINISTRATION

#### Sponsor Services Expenses: \$75,362

Tiny Seed's administration expenses were very efficient at only 7.1% of consolidated revenue. Our largest administration expense (81.4%) consisted of contractor payments of \$61,350. Going forward CPA expense is expected to increase from \$2,800 in 2023 to \$12,000 in 2024 as we engage GT Reilly to prepare a full audit of 2023 results. We also expect Legal and Compliance expenses to increase as we expand professional services relationships.

# Tiny Seed's Three Cs Conservation - Creativity - Community

Identifying priority project types within the three Cs of our mission, with a geographic focus area of Northern New England (VT, NH, ME, MA)

#### Conservation

- Environmental Justice Advocacy: Projects working on conservation efforts in communities disproportionately affected by environmental issues, including climate change, and addressing systemic inequalities.
- Equitable Access to Green Spaces: Projects working to ensure their communities, regardless of racial or socioeconomic background, have equal access to and benefit from green and natural spaces.
- Indigenous Land Stewardship: Projects whose focus is supporting Indigenous communities in their traditional land management and conservation practices.

#### Creativity

- Art for Community Justice: Projects that encourage artistic expressions that challenge systemic racism, promote dialogue, and new narratives, and amplify underrepresented voices.
- Literature and Media for Inclusive Narratives: Projects that use literature, films, and media to highlight diverse perspectives, challenge stereotypes, and contribute to understanding.
- Cultural Heritage Preservation: Projects that preserve and celebrate the cultural heritage of diverse communities, recognizing the importance of cultural diversity in creative endeavors.

#### Community

- Food Sovereignty and Equity: Projects that advocate for equitable access to healthy and culturally appropriate food, addressing food deserts and supporting minority-owned farms.
- Indigenous Cultural Revitalization: Projects that preserve and revitalize Indigenous cultures, acknowledge historical injustices, and work towards reconciliation.
- Community-Led Racial Justice Initiatives: Projects that focus on racial justice, provide resources, and amplify their impact.




