WHERE WE ARE NOW

Tiny Seed is celebrating our sixth year of empowering project leaders to create positive change in their communities! We had a very successful 2024, with total program services funding increasing by 50% to \$1,464,212 (from \$977,365 in 2023) and continued expansion of our portfolio of community projects.

During 2024, Tiny Seed sponsored 28 Fiscally Sponsored Projects (FSPs) that align with our mission, an increase from 22 last year. Our onboarding process was streamlined in 2024, allowing us to add a number of impactful new FSPs, while four former projects achieved their goals and were wound down by year-end.

We engaged GT Reilly to complete our first annual CPA Audit in 2024. The audit was comprehensive and detailed, requiring six months to complete, and resulted in a clean opinion. We learned a lot and are pleased that the audit confirmed Tiny Seed's operating systems are accurate and timely, with robust internal controls.

Tiny Seed received a grant from You Have Our Trust in 2024. This multi-year commitment of \$50k (\$25k/year) opened the door to foundation support. It also validated improvements funded by the Vermont Community Foundation in 2023, including a refined mission statement, clearer website, and a compelling Funding Proposal. We continue this momentum to engage new funding partnerships.

Funding Proposal for Mission Delivery Team. Tiny Seed continues to be run by three contract workers who provide daily support for FSPs. During 2024, our contractors were paid from sponsor revenue generated by incoming funds to fiscally sponsored projects. During 2025 one of Tiny Seed's primary strategic goals is to attain supplemental funding that allows a transition to permanent employee status for our Directors of Operations, Finance, and Development.

Our Advisory Board was expanded with the addition of five new members in 2024. Tiny Seed achieved our 2024 goal of expanding and diversifying the Advisory Board with individuals living in the communities we serve. This improved representation of diverse perspectives has strengthened our impact, built credibility with funders, and increased connection with donors and community partners.



2024 REVENUE

Program Services: \$1,464,212 (+50%)

Sponsor Services: \$ 161,571 (+80%)

Federal grants totaled 16% of 2024 program revenue


In 2024, Tiny Seed saw continued strong organic growth in Program Services revenue as we expanded our portfolio from 22 to 28 programs, and many existing programs increased fundraising activities. Total Program Services revenue increased 50% to \$1,464,212 and represents solid funding support from many sources including private donations, foundations, government grants, corporate grants, and fundraising events.

To fund Tiny Seed's administrative platform, Sponsor Services revenue increased 80% to \$161,571 as a result of higher incoming funds to program services, as well as \$26,000 of direct grants to support sponsor services overhead costs. We are an industry leader in efficiency, with 90.0% of revenues available for program-related activities, with the remaining 10.0% of revenue allocated to administration and operating expenses.

2024 ADMINISTRATION

Sponsor Services Expenses: \$130,859

Administration costs are very efficient at 8.0% of consolidated revenue, primarily driven by total contractor payments of \$101,770 (77.8%) for our Directors of Operations, Finance, & Development. CPA Audit expense increased to \$15,600 in 2024 as we engaged GT Reilly to prepare our first annual audit of the 2023 Fiscal Year. Tiny Seed's subscription to the grant-seeking platform Instrumentl, cost \$3,900 in 2024 and saved us 2,475 hours in grant research, while bringing in an additional \$238,000 for our sponsored projects.



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS





Biodiversity Builders

- Students sold 334 plants at their native plant sale
- Planted 5 native plant gardens
- · Designed and implemented 4 container gardens, and 4 home gardens
- Removed 270 baskets of invasive water chestnuts from Arlington Reservoir, plus 3 other invasive plant pulls

No Loose Braids

- Built a Wetu (cedar home) at P8guaso Farm and a Mishoon (burned out canoe) with the Nipmuc Tribal Council of the Chaubunagungamuag
- · Constructed community pavilion at Wampanoag Common Lands with the Native Land Conservancy
- · No Loose Braids became an official Woodbank for Nipmuc community members





NCABC

- · Strengthened collaboration with conservation groups to advance responsible waste management
- Expanded public education about NH environmental policy through partnerships and grassroots efforts
- · 2024 saw unprecedented support from citizens, businesses, legislators, and the media

Super Compost Project

- Completed first cohort of 7 elementary school Compost Sites with 10 more slated for 2025 - 2026
- · Secured state, federal, and private grant funding to continue installing Compost Sites
- · Schools received construction support, essential supplies, and two years of technical support that starts when the build is completed

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS





Joseph Rock Arboretum

- · Led 8 community and school tours
- Hosted interns from local schools, colleges, and Canada
- Planted Hawaiian dry, hardwood, and succulent species

Holyoke Food and Equity Collective

- Food Access: Built 11 garden beds, gave 97 bucket planters, and sold 24 seedling shares
- · Community Engagement: Hosted 110 attendees at the first Collective Dinner
- Sustainability: Launched a compost hub, diverting 350+ lbs. of food waste





Proyecto Rosenda

- Distributed approximately 5,000 trees in the communities we serve, at no cost
- Worked directly with 45-50 families in 6 communities encompassing 3 ecologically diverse regions
- Developed relationship with the local co-op nursery "Manos de la Tierra," run by seven families



Odenong Powwow

- Hosted the Fourth Annual Odenong Powwow in May 2024
- Served 140 meals to Native American community members, including elders, veterans, and powwow participants and performers
- Provided \$30,000 in earned compensation to Indigenous dancers, singers, and powwow staff
- Facilitated \$10,000+ in sales for Indigenous artisans, creators, and crafts makers

MISSION ACCOMPLISHED!

Three of Tiny Seed's sponsored projects achieved their missions, and were completed during 2024 (NGA, PAI, and Gayogohono), while one sponsored project transferred to an indigenous non-profit organization aligned with their work (ICEF)



Northeast Grainshed Alliance

The Northeast Grainshed Alliance (NGA) successfully connected and strengthened the grain community across the Northeast, creating a vibrant network of bakers, brewers, growers, and more. With initiatives like the SQFT Project and Neighbor Loaves, along with USDA grant support, NGA expanded regional grain production's impact and has now passed its legacy to the Maine Grain Alliance to continue the movement.



Perrenial Agriculture Insitute

Mitigating climate change by accelerating the adoption of agroforestry and perennial crops. Publications include "Trees with Edible Leaves" and "Perennial staple crops: Yields, distribution, and nutrition in the global food system"



Gayogohó:nọ'

In a significant victory for the Gayogohó:nọ' (Cayuga) Nation, New York's Fourth Department Appellate Court ruled that Clint Halftown's "Cayuga Nation Tribal Court" lacks due process and cannot enforce its decisions in state courts. While challenges to sovereignty and treaty obligations persist, the Gayogohó:nọ' Sovereignty and Rematriation Project has empowered the community to continue defending their rights and cultural legacy.



Indigenous Crops of Eastern Forests

Create a history book, wildlands management manual, and guide to traditional eating knowledge and nutrition, based on historical research on the significance of Indigenous Foodways and land management practices prior to colonization.
